REMEMBERING SÜREYYA SERDENGEÇTI

Süreyya Serdengeçti was a graduate of the GPED in 1986. He began working at the Central Bank of Turkey in 1980, beginning in the Exchange Department's Debt Relief division. graduating, he served in many managerial roles, eventually working his way to being appointed as the Governor of the Central Bank on March 14, 2001. During his 5 years of governorship, the US dollar exchange rate fell from 1.60 to 1.30 Turkish Lira, the annual inflation rate from 37.51% to 8.15%, and the overnight interest rate from 120% to 13.5%. His term ended on March 14, 2006, he then went on to be a senior lecturer at TOBB Economics and Technology University in the Economics Department until his death on July 26, 2025, at the age of 73.






DISCUSSIONS WITH GPED ALUMNI

Suhas Ketkar 1973



I am happy to inform you that I have just published my memoirs -- From the City of Djinns to the Promised Land: An Immigrant's Story. I recount in these memoirs my journey from Sangli on the Krishna River in central India to New York city on the Hudson with many long and short intermittent stops. Highlighted in the memoirs are my 12 plus years of association with Vanderbilt -- as a PhD student (1968-72), as a visiting assistant professor (1975-78), and as a visiting professor (2006-2011), my 25 years in commercial and investment banking in New York, and my many consulting projects with the World Bank. Themes of resilience, cultural identity, adaptation, and intergenerational legacy resonate throughout these memoirs, hopefully creating a stimulating reading experience that touches on universal aspects of human experience. I have a long association with Vanderbilt University. I consider myself an adopted alumnus of the GPED. I was a visiting assistant professor in the economics department for three years starting in September 1975. Subsequently, I returned to Vanderbilt as a visiting professor in 2006 after spending 25 years on Wall Street. For two of my five years in Nashville, I served as director of the GPED. Speaking at the 50th anniversary of the GPED in 2007, I highlighted the contribution of Professor James Worley who served as the GPED director for 25 years, and then recounted Muhammad Yunus' visit to Vanderbilt in 1977. On that visit, Yunus presented a seminar on his incipient thinking on microfinance. On the evening of his seminar, I invited the entire department faculty to meet and greet Yunus at our apartment. Most people left by 9:30 or 10 PM. Mrs. Rosemary Worley concluded that Jim would not be ready to leave for quite some time and she bailed out around midnight. My wife Kusum retired by 1 AM. Still, Jim, Yunus and I kept on talking. For the first and last time ever, I ran out of all the drinks – alcoholic and non-alcoholic – in my house. Still, our conversation continued. Finally, we decided to call it quits around 6 AM. I concluded my remarks by saying "Jim was so proud of Yunus even then. Imagine how much more proud he would be now!" The very fact that you are studying in the GPED confirms that you are smart. Put that smartness to good use. Take advantage of the small class sizes to develop good and close relationships with your professors. Don't shy away from taking challenging courses. Work hard on your thesis to come up with a publishable paper.

Zacharey Carmichael 2012

Zacharey Carmichael graduated from GPED in 2012 and currently serves as a Senior Agriculture Economist in the World Bank Group's Agriculture and Food (AGF) Global Department. He is the technical coordinator for the Crisis Response Window Early Response Financing (CRW ERF) — a US\$1 billion instrument that enables countries to scale up early action in response to emerging food and nutrition security crises.

In addition, Zacharey is a member of the Coordination Unit for the Global Agriculture and Food Security Program (GAFSP) and supports the Bank's engagement in both the Global Network Against Food Crises (GNAFC) and the Integrated Food Security Phase Classification (IPC) initiatives.

Specializing in food security crisis risk management and strategic capacity building, he leads a global team advancing the development of Preparedness Plans and crisis risk modeling across more than 30 countries.

Previously, in the World Bank's Fragility, Conflict, and Violence (FCV)
Department, Zacharey led pilot efforts under the Famine Action Mechanism
(FAM), contributed to the Bank's first FCV Strategy, co-led the Global Crisis Risk
Platform (GCRP), and helped launch the Lebanon Financing Facility (LFF).
Earlier in his career, he worked in the World Bank Treasury's Capital Markets

Group on funding and derivatives transactions, and prior to joining the Bank, held roles in interest rate and foreign exchange derivatives at major investment banks.
