"Tender Flesh: Race and Sensation in Medieval English Literature"

This project details the emergence of racial ideologies immanent to late medieval writings on the bodily sensorium. In fourteenth and fifteenth-century England, poets, theologians, natural scientists, and preachers effectuated the experience of morality proper to the good Christian subject. These writers, moving between investigating the physical sensation of sin in one's own body and prescribing ways of discerning the morality of others in their physical appearance, transform the scene of perception into a charged site for discerning moral truth.
