-In the past year, I've resequenced the Department of Spanish and Portuguese's intermediate Spanish program rolling out three new language courses to better suit the needs of our students' acquisition of Spanish, academic schedules, and learning goals: Intermediate SPAN 2201, Intermediate SPAN 2202, and Accelerated Intermediate SPAN 2204.

-I've recently developed and gotten approved SPAN 3840, a service-learning course titled "Undocumented in the U.S." that will be taught when the pandemic subsides, and students are encouraged to interact off campus with community partners.

-I've undergone training for Immersion Vanderbilt and begun advising my first of two projects that I've accepted.

-I participated in the VU Center for Teaching's 2019-2020 Community Engagement Seminar in addition to attending their training for moving course content online in response to the COVID-19 epidemic.

-As coordinator of Intermediate Spanish 2203 (2008-Spring 2021), I chaired a textbook selection committee and restructured VU's intermediate Spanish course curriculum, incorporating the flipped classroom design, social media, and project-based learning. Additionally, I've observed, supervised, and mentored GTAs and lecturers' teaching.

-In 2015 I assumed the role of Lead Coordinator of Spanish Language Courses, organizing observations and planning the fall orientation sessions for all language instructors in the Department of Spanish and Portuguese.

-I've served on the E. Inman Fox Graduate Teaching Assistant Award since 2009.

-As a faculty VUceptor in the Vanderbilt Visions program (2007-present), I've served each year as advisor, co-facilitator of peer discussions, and mentor to a group of 18 first-year students. Similarly, I've interviewed prospective student VUceptors, trained new faculty and student VUceptors, and have served on the committee to select the executive board of the Vanderbilt Visions program and the Walther Award for VUcept Excellence selection. Additionally, I served as a VU Visions "Mastermind Group Discussion Leader," helping to train new faculty and undergraduate VUceptors in 2017.

-In the summer of 2018 I taught a course on undocumented immigration to senior citizens with VU's Osher Lifetime Learning Institute (OLLI). I also developed and taught a course on Spanish Film and Cuisine for OLLI to a group of 140 senior citizens (Fall 2014) and to a group of 18 first-year students in the Commons Seminar program (Spring 2011).

-I've developed and taught since 2016 a First-Year Writing Seminar titled "Rewriting Spain: The Cinematographic Re-inscription of Nation and Gender".

-I shared my research on and experiences with project-based learning, dealing with students of concern, helping to maintain and recruit majors/minors, and the incorporation of social media into the Spanish language classroom at the Department of Spanish and Portuguese's fall orientation sessions in 2013, 2015-2018.
